


# The Window View

In a dog eat dog world, one dad is going the extra mile to show his step daughter the extent of love and generosity. "I decided to do this so that I could do something for her." Glenn Miller states about his step daughter, Jace Peace. Peace has been playing softball for five years. Each year, like many sports teams, a fundraiser is held to buy equipment and jerseys. Miller helped Peace by

going to local businesses and asking them to donate towards the fundraiser without accepting the food that came along with it. The money is a tax write off whereas the food is not. Once the fundraiser was over, Miller and Peace came to Executive Director, Ed Swartley, and asked him to make a selection based on the amount of money given. Miller believed that the food should be used to benefit someone who needs it rather than sitting in an office refrigerator going bad. Swartley was astounded that a 12 year old would be interested in helping her community. View: Why did you decide to apply for the Kitchen Job at the Window?

Vi: I just felt I could get on board with your mission here. Hospitality is a huge passion of mine... I love having people over. It's just been within the past five years that I thought about cooking for a living. Previously, I've worked in the

healthcare field since'81.

Program Spotlight: Katie's Kitchen

View: What's caused you to change your career path?

Vi: Several years ago, my husband and I got an opportunity to work with Youth With a

Mission (YWAM). So we packed up our three little girls and moved to India for a whole year. As soon as we got back, our contact in India was anxious to have us back. But it wasn't until Steve (Miller's husband) went on a mission trip with Carmen (one of Miller's daughters) when she was in high school that made us realize we needed to go back. This time though, we served as pastoral care ministries for local church planters. I loved that. I have a heart to open a retreat center one day.

View: It would seem that you love people more than cooking.

Vi: (Laughs) I also got a chance to cook authentic Indian for over 100 people when I was there and I had my own catering business for five years, but I think you're right.

View: What are you most excited about working here?

Vi: I am most excited about giving a place for the community to find hope, peace, and to be treated like the image of God

that they are, just like I'm made in the image of God.

On April 22nd, 2013, The View sat down with three Meals on Wheels recipients and asked about their experience. All have mobility issues, medical problems, and are homebound. While Marilyn "Joan" Reith and Lloyd Miller allowed us to use their name and picture, a third client, referred to as "Esther," chose to tell her story anonymously.

View: Why did you decide to receive homedelivered meals?

"Esther": I was bedridden with no friends or family near.

Joan: I had six falls in 2011 due to over medication (sic)...In December of that year, I fell forward...I laid there 13 hours. My grandson found me, a stroke."

Lloyd: My wife was in a lift chair. Since I was working 5 or 6 days a week, caring for my wife alone, one meal a day

was very helpful.

View: What other options were available to you if you could not receive meals at your home?

"Esther": I was not sure, might have had to stay in nursing home."

Lloyd: More runs to the grocery store and less attention to her care. She died this year.

View: What do you hope to gain by receiving home delivered meals?

"Esther": being able to stay in my home

Joan: My two daughters said I wasn't eating balanced meals, they are all working and will be for some time. This is my way of eating to feel better.

Lloyd: More variety of food, often ideas of food I can make. Some one checking on me regularly.

View: Is there anything else you would like to let us know?

Esther"Thank you.

Joan: I appreciate this service so much. I eat every bite. Thank you and your volunteers.

Lloyd: I love and appreciate those ladies! (His volunteer delivery drivers)

Almost all of our recipients are on fixed income through Social Security and/or disability. Each meal is valued at \$7.10, which will continue to rise with inflation. Coupled with the sequestrating of federal funds in March 2013, The Window is pinching every penny to ensure no eligible senior goes hungry.

#### FROM THE DIRECTOR

Each recipient is asked to pay for a portion of his or her meal. This "pledge" is individualized and dependent on how much income each Meals on Wheels recipient earns a month. For some, they are more than willing to pay for the whole cost. For others, they can only afford to give \$5.00 a month because the rest must go towards their housing or prescriptions.

However, if no funding is found The Window will have no choice but to "stop the wheels" on this valuable community program.

You can help. We are looking for businesses, churches, service groups, or individuals who are willing to sponsor a senior who can not afford the meals. We were awarded NAP tax credits from IHCDA to be distributed to any individual who sponsors a senior. See their web-

site for more information. You can make a difference in the lives of others just like "Esther", Joan, and Lloyd.

Lloyd Miller is a kind jokester who believes that he is lucky to be alive. A few weeks ago, Lloyd took a fall which landed him in the hospital. After being admitted for also having influenza A, he suffered a stroke. However, he recovered completely within two days. "The doctors say nobody can do that, but I did."
